
Presentations and information were relevant, useful & actionable: 97.2% strongly agreed or agreed: 2.8% disagreed

The data presented was eye-opening and presented in a user-friendly format; Great job; Fabulous meeting!





The findings reflect activities from the Heath Equity Evidence Academy, the Corporate Wellness Evidence Academy, and the Survivorship Evidence Academy held in 2019.



Topics Included:

- Understanding the collateral consequences of structural inequality

92% or greater increase in participants' knowledge and understanding




BIAS KNOWLEDGE CHECK

Attendees were asked true or false questions about bias; **ALL** attendees answered the following questions correctly.

In healthcare, unconscious bias might affect a provider's line of questioning and lead to misdiagnosis

Unconscious bias can affect body language and other cues that cause patients to lose trust, withhold information, or fail to follow medical advice

Definition of bias and privilege are relevant to decreasing health disparities in South Carolina

•"It can be an emotional experience to see the amount of privilege or lack of privilege others had to deal with."


